Barry Ratcliffe didn't have time to let a hand injury get in the way of his busy acting career.

That's why Ratcliffe, perhaps best known for his work on the TV show "Outsiders" and the movie "The Longest Ride," turned to Summit Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation to regain normal function of his hand.

"It's clear he puts the patient first," Ratcliffe said. "And I love his sense of humor."
